President – Paul J. Kennedy - South Jersey Celtic Society



Currently RBANA, US Director, North East, Paul Kennedy is a retired US Army Aviation Officer with more than 30 years of service to his country. Paul is a retired Audit Manager with the US Department of Defense, Office of Inspector General.

Paul is a co-founder, past President, and current Vice President

for Finance of the South Jersey Celtic Society (SJCS) whose mission is to promote and support Celtic Culture in and around Southern New Jersey. Paul was instrumental in designing the SJCS's mission, program, and fundraising activities, and instituting the SJCS's premier event, the annual SJCS Robert Burns Supper, held on or near the Bards Birthday each January. In fact, the society's 17th Annual Robert Burns Supper was held on January 22nd and attended by over 80 members and guests ranging in age from 18 to 84. Paul was also the catalyst for the SJCS becoming a member of, and participating in the Robert Burns Association of North America (RBANA) and the Robert Burns World Federation (RBWF) where he currently holds positions as a US Director for RBANA, and a member of the Events Committee for RBWF.

In addition to hosting the annual Burns Supper, and due to its successful fundraising activities, SJCS provides scholarships, monetary awards, and other support to Celtic organizations such as local Pipe Bands, Scottish and Irish Dance Clubs and even institutions such as The Rosenbach Museum for the preservation of its collection of original Burns' Manuscripts and its Bloomsday celebration. Due in large part to Paul's early vision, the SJCS co-hosted a NJ Celtic Festival known as "Kilt Fest" in October 2021; now an annual event.

In its civic role, SJCS supports its local community, first responders and military organizations, and, as part of its cultural education program, the SJCS conducts quarterly whisky tastings under its "SJCS Scotch and Whiskey Appreciation Club" banner. During this past year under severe conditions due to the COVID pandemic, our organization raised more than \$3,000 in cash and food products for three local food banks.

Paul is a Celtic musician and performs regularly with friends and family at Irish and Scottish Festivals, Renaissance Fairs and other events. He is an avid reader, poetry lover and amateur classical guitarist. He has attended Burns Suppers in both Iraq and Afghanistan and in one case, addressed the Haggis in Baghdad only to do it again in New Jersey two days later. Paul is married to his wife, Lynn, of 46 years, and together they have 5 children and 14 grandchildren.

Vice-President – Mark Ferguson - Burns Club of Atlanta



Ark was born in Helensburgh, a provincial Scottish town situated on the River Clyde and named after the wife of Sir James Colquhoun, who founded the town at the end of the 18th century. Mark has a great af-

fection for his home country despite having left there after he graduated from Strathclyde University in Glasgow in 1983 with a BEng in Production Engineering & Management. He joined Cadbury Schweppes Plc and moved to St Albans, a historic market town famed for it's 8th Century Abbey commemorating Alban the first Christian martyr, in England. He first met his wife Elaine two weeks after his arrival and they were married in 1987.

In 1991, Mark transferred to work for The Coca-Cola Company and moved to Brussels, Belgium the de facto capital of the European Union,

where his son Alexander was born in 1996. That same year Mark and his family moved to Vienna, Austria known as "The City of Dreams" as it was home to Sigmund Freud the father of psychoanalysis, where his daughter Melanie was born in 1998. The next move was made in 2001 when the Ferguson's moved to Dublin, Ireland famed for Guinness and Trinity college, home to the famous Book of Kells. Here Mark and his family enjoyed 8 happy years before making their final move to Atlanta, Georgia in 2009.

Mark took early retirement from The Coca-Cola Company in Atlanta in 2015, after a 32-year career

and is now President of PAALMCoaching an executive business coaching concern. In addition to being an NLP Master Coach, Master Practitioner of NLP, Timeline TherapyTM, and Hypnotherapy, he is an accomplished amateur singer and speaker with a particular love of Robert Burns, Scotland's famous son whose works were taught as a compulsory part of the Scottish Education Curriculum.

Mark currently serves as a director of the Board of the Burns Club of Atlanta a position he has held since 2018, having joined the club in 2015. Mark joined the RBANA Board as a US Director in 2019 and currently sits on the Membership Subcommittee of the RBWF. He is also a member of the Clan Fergusson Society of North America, which he joined in 2016 and currently serves as Secretary. Mark became a naturalized US Citizen on December 6, 2019.

A first generation Canadian, being born into a family that emigrated from Aberdeen Scotland. Since the age of 2 weeks old, he has been attending various Scottish events throughout Calgary, Alberta, Canada, and the United States, with his' parents and sisters all being involved in some way to one or more Scottish groups in Calgary. Always

surrounded by the culture, at the age of 12, he started to learn Scottish Country Dancing as his sister needed an extra body for her demonstration team. Around the same time, he started attending many Burns suppers and started appreciating them for what they are. Throughout the years, he began attending more and more functions, and joined a number of groups and organizations, and served on the Board of Directors for almost all of them. Those he has yet to join the Board of Directors of he currently serves on some sort of committee for them. A Past President of RBANA, Ken Montgomery was born and raised in Edmonton, Alberta with roots back to the Mull of Kintyre in Argyllshire. In 1769 his family immigrated to the British colony of St. John's Island (later renamed Prince Edward Island) and

claims that island's famous authoress, Lucy Maud Montgomery (Anne of Green Gables) as a distant cousin. In 1898 the family then moved to Western Dawson City, Yukon, as well, of course in Winnipeg.

Following his retirement from the retirement in 1992 he pursued a Business Administration Certificate at Red River College and applied his military training as a Civil Engineer with JR Cousins Consultants for 14 years before retiring in 2016

His volunteer activities include working with Canadian Diabetes Association; Cancer Society of Canada; Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada and the Housing Committee - Kirkfield Park United Church. - The winner will be chosen by a three-member panel comprising of Dr. Moira Hansen from the Centre for Robert Burns Studies at Glasgow University and member of RBWF Ltd Executive; long standing judge and member of RBWF Ltd Willie Gibson; and 2021 Jack Hume Trophy winner Jim Fletcher from Hali-

fax, NS. Entries will be submitted to the panel anonymously, and the panel's decision will be final.

- The winner will be announced in the July Edition of the RBANA Newsletter 'The Tattler' that will be published on 31st July 2022. The trophy will be shipped to the winner.
- This trophy is awarded annually. The winner is responsible for returning the trophy to the RBANA Secretary or President prior to the following year AGM & Confer-

Edmonton's Big Night "Lite"




Night. The risks to members

Ronnie O'Byrne, (left) originally from Winchburgh in West Lothian, Scotland and who now calls the wine country of Niagara, Ontario home is the Canadian Director of the Robert Burns World Federation,

(RBWF) and also for RBANA. Ronnie joined us from his home in Ontario. In his official capacity he shared greetings from the RBWF and then shared his thoughts on and a rendition of one of his favourite Burns' poems *Epistle to a Young Friend*. He then told us how his interest in Burns developed and shared an original poem, *I Don't Like Poetry*, that he wrote reflecting on that development.

A Big Night, even a Big Night 'Lite', would not be the same without some beautiful piano music. On this night, Club pianist Joachim Segger shared some prerecorded music starting with a medley Ye Banks and Braes. Later in the evening he also shared a splendid medley including Oh! Whistle and A Highland Lad.

It then fell to Club member Tony Kernahan (right) to propose the Toast to the Lassies. Tony, whose mother was a Scot, grew up in Northern Ireland spoke of a time when there were but two books in Ulster homes - the Bible and Burns. Tony also told the group that on January 29th, 1810 his ancestor Robert Tannahill composed



a poem for the Burns Anniversary meeting at the Paisley Burns Club (formed in 1804).

Again the happy day returns, A day to Scotsmen ever dear, The bleakest of the changeful year, It blest us with a Burns

Reflecting of the life and times of the Bard and his relationships with women, Tony cited many of his poems, well known and less so. His presentation is best summed up in his own words, "... he loved the lassies in a most caring and supportive way ... Burns was completely open about his relationships with his lady friends; and many of his poems reflect his romantic thoughts towards them. ... The lassies, then, in Burns' eyes were and are to be loved, cared for and treasured."

Club Piper David Trew (right) followed with another Club tradition playing a medley of tunes on the fabled Waterloo pipes to the memory of those we've lost. Dave also played the original tune specially written by Iain MacCrimmon to celebrate the Edmonton Burns Club Centenary in 2020, 100 Years Strong.





The Toast to the Twa' Lands was delivered by another senior member, John Boyd (left). In his presentation John was sometimes serious, oft-times funny as he spoke of the ties between Scotland and Canada past and present.

Echoing a theme from our earlier speaker, John said,

"Scotland has exported it's people, educated and humble, for hundreds of years - mostly to the English-speaking world bearing the Bible and the Scottish Bible - Burns."

John, a poet himself, talked of Scotland's other famous sons, Robert Louis Stevenson, Byron and Walter Scott. He also shared his knowledge of transplanted Scots including "One I discovered some time ago ... Alexander McLaughlan. Born near Paisley, in 1818, and came to Canada ... he was heralded as the Canadian Burns." He also reflected, "I think Alex McLaughlan would have made a great Big Night speaker."

A retired doctor, John also spoke of significant Scots and Canadian contributions to medicine from "Flemming's unwitting discovery of penicillin" through to recent times when, "a biochemist in Edmonton, James Collip who, from that extract, puri-

fied insulin saving billions around the world from the scourge of diabetes."

Presentation of *The Immortal Memory* was by one of the youngest Club members, Alex Thomson (right). An Ayrshire native, Alex was up to the challenge. He spoke of the challenges that Covid has created over the past two years, pointing out that the virtual approach to the Big Night in no way diminishes the importance of Burns. As he continued, Alex reflected on our absent friends, George Reid,

Bert Barker and Raymond Grant and cited some of his personal memories of his interactions with them. His presentation was also interspersed with some good humour and reflected his broad knowledge of Burns.



And, so the 2022 Big Night 'Lite' of the Edmonton Burns Club was concluded in the usual manner with *Auld Lang Syne*. Not quite the same in a Zoom gathering but important to the Club tradition. Based on the feedback from all participants, a guid time was had by ane and a'.

Globe Inn Owners Plan to Turn Derelict Building into Robert Burns Museum

A derelict building in Dumfries High Street could be turned into a Robert Burns museum and international visitor centre.

A planning application has been submitted to the council to revamp the bakehouse building on Globe Close, next to the Globe Inn.

Robert Burns' Globe Inn Ltd recently secured the purchase of the building and is proposing to transform it into a museum, exhibition and conference centre which they say, will "form the heart of the Dumfries Burns' quarter". The planning application states that the project "aims to bring local, national and international visitors to Dumfries town centre building on the legacy of Scotland's national poet Robert



Burns".

It added: "This investment will not only act as a catalyst for Burns enthusiasts visiting the area but will also bring much needed footfall to Dumfries town centre and Dumfries and Galloway". The historic Globe Inn next door is home of the Burns Room and Howff

Club and has long been recognised as an important venue associated with Robert Burns' time in Dumfries.

If the plans are given the green light, the bakehouse building would be complimented with Tudor style timber beams and the windows and doors replaced with timber sash and case. The application states: "These will be a massive improvement from what has been present on the site for many decades."

Burns, The Elites and Freemasonry

U.S. Director George McClellan has shared with us the Toast to the Immortal Memory which he delivered to the Masonic Lodge #124 in Sandy Springs GA. Fellow U.S. Director Mark Ferguson is Worshipful Master of the Lodge. George relates that it is an edited chapter of his own biography of the Bard.

▲ n Robert Burns' era, the mid 1700s, Edinburgh was the shining city on the hill, the oasis of intellectual achievement; that bright spot in the firmament of the advance of Western Civilization, teeming with Accordingly, Burns dedicated his first 'Edinburgh thousands of people from all over Europe and the Realm; it was the magnet for men of science and literature everywhere. It was where institutions of higher learning flourished, great thinkers were produced and international reputations were made. It was "The Athens of the North."

Talent recognizes genius and the Literati of Edinburgh was filled with talent; and it was where Robert Burns was invited because of his rising notoriety and where, when he displayed it, his genius could not be denied. The simple problem, of course, was that genius or not, Burns was not one of them.

He was a peasant farmer, a plowman from Ayrshire whose 'low' class standing had to be provided for. That he wrote beautifully in Broad Scots but mostly about the people of his class, his writings exciting envy and admiration at all levels, meant that he could not be ignored, shelved or worse, suborned by the idea of social rank consciousness. Burns had to be recognized for his gift because in Scotland the Reformation had fed the people of the whole nation with a thirst for education which, by the close of the 18th Century, caused Scotland to have the most literate population in Europe.

By invitation Burns was entering a world unfamiliar to him. He wrote:

"At Edinburgh, I was in a new world: I mingled among many classes of men, but all of them new to me, and I was all attention to 'catch' the characters and the 'manners living as they rise.' Whether I have profited, time will show."

First among the organized recognizers of Burns's genius was the Caledonian Hunt, a group of noblemen and gentlemen of wealth who shared a love of



sport, gala balls, and gracious living. I believe we would call them "Playboy's" today. Many of the 'Hunt' members personally befriended Burns and became his individual patrons. They loved Burns's first printing of his poems, the Kilmarnock edition and in

consequence ponied up funds for another edition. Edition' to the Hunt with this flowery inscription:

"Though much indebted to your goodness, I do not approach you, my Lords and Gentlemen, in the usual stile of dedication, to thank you for past favors; that path is so hackneyed by prostituted learning, that honest rusticity is ashamed of it. Nor do I present this address with the venal soul of a servile author, looking for a continuation of those favors. I was bred to the plough and am independent. I come to claim the common Scottish name with you, my illustrious countrymen; and to tell the world that I glory in the title. I come to congratulate my country, that the blood of her ancient hero's still runs uncontaminated; and that from your courage, knowledge and public spirit, she may expect protection, wealth and liberty... "(10 January 1787).

Notice in his dedication that Burns does not bow and scrape as a "servile author" to his patrons. He thanks them for their patronage but quickly strips away any pretense that he is beneath them. Instead, he proudly acknowledges his lowly station of birth, but glories with them as equals, as common Scotsmen. While he acknowledges their patronage, he denies he needs their favors. Thus, Burns has set the rules for his en-

trance into Edinburgh's elite

As recognition "for superior merit," the Club's secretary, upon a motion by the Earl of Glencairn (left) and seconded by one John Whitefoord, (sic) was directed to subscribe one hundred copies in their name and pay

Robert Burns the handsome sum of 25 pounds upon publication. Five years later, on 16 April 1792, his reputation firmly established, Burns was enrolled as a member of the Caledonian Hunt.

The Caledonian Hunt was not the only organization in which Burns found himself in happy company. The Freemasons were equally enthralled with him. Burns first 'entered' a Lodge of Free Masons as an 'apprentice' on 4 July 1781. This was the St. David Lodge in Tarbolton. He was 23. He subsequently was 'passed' to the Fellowcraft Degree then 'raised to Master Mason on 1st October 1781. To be historically correct, it should be noted that there were two lodges in Tarbolton at the time. The first had been chartered from the original Kilwinning Lodge in 1771. In 1773 for some reason, a group broke away and formed their own lodge called St. David No. 174. The original Lodge became St. James Tarbolton Lodge No. 178. The two lodges reunited in 1781, a few days, actually, before Burns joined, and the St. David name remained thus sowing the seeds of dissension for another breakup which occurred a year later, in June 1782. Burns elected to associate himself with the St. James Lodge and in July 1784 was elected Depute Master. Burns ran the lodge much as a Worshipful Master does today. The Lodges Worshipful Master, an honorary position then, belonged to Sir John Whitefoord. In 1786, Robert's brother Gilbert, joined the lodge as well.

In context, 1786 was an eventful year for Robert Burns. His carnal and emotional affairs with Jean Armor, Mary Campbell, et. al, the birth of his two children by Jean, the shocking news of the death of Mary, his child support problems and his decision to flee to Jamaica, all occurred in this year. In July 1786, his Kilmarnock Edition also hit the street and 350 brethren of St. John's Lodge of Kilmarnock, subscribed to purchase a copy. In October, he was made an honorary member of that lodge and consequently, he wrote "Masonic Song" to honor the lodge and its Master, Major William Parker. Burn's association with Masonry can be directly related to the rise in the popularity of his poems. In 1787, after he arrived in Edinburgh, Burns visited St. Andrew Lodge at which was present the Grand Lodge of Scotland, including the Grand Worshipful

Master, Francis Charteris. To Burn's complete surprise, the Grand Master rose and introduced Burns to the assembly as "Caledonia and Caledonia's bard, Brother Robert Burns." The applause was thunderous and a clearly humbled Robert Burns, was caught completely off guard. Later, still in 1787, Burns was appointed Poet Laureate of Canongate - Kilwinning

Lodge No.2, Edinburgh, where he was unanimously elected an honorary member. The first Edinburgh Edition of Burn's poems was released in April 1787 and many of the subscribers to it were Lodge members, including the publisher, William Creech (right). In May 1787 Burns was 'exalted' a companion in the Holy Royal



Arch Degree at St. Ebbe's Lodge, Eyemouth, with all fee's waived. Later, in 1788, when Burns moved back to Dumfries, he joined St. Andrews Lodge where, in 1792, he was elected Senior Warden for one year.

Burns's revealed his Masonic affection in many of his works. His Masonic ideals are reflected in "A Man's a Man for a' That" for example, when he writes "man to man the warld o'er, shall brothers be for a' that!" His dedication to the ideals of "liberty, fraternity, equality," that the French Revolution was supposed to create (but didn't), were Masonic ideals that

Burns completely embraced and explains his nearly being charged with sedition with his poems supporting the goals of the French and American revolutions.

His rocky relationship with the Calvinist Kirk, speaks of his belief as a mason that the rights of all people to pursue religion as they saw fit should be respected even for non-denominational believers who did not necessarily subscribe to the conformity of organized salvation.

In Edinburgh, Burns was at least surrounded by some people who, no matter their social rank, honored and respected him as a 'brother' for his genius and its product. The non-Masonic literati of the higher social classes admired him but only afford him any social respect, begrudgingly.

Gentlemen, rules notwithstanding, will you charge your glasses, please be upstanding and join me in a heartfelt toast to Robert Burns!
