St Andrew's Society of Winnipeg Takes To The Ice for Kilt Skate 2022

It takes a certain twisted determination to do something as impractical as skating with bare knees when the thermometer tells you it's 25 below, but with the wind chill, it feels like 40 below. The Scots have a word for it: THRAWN!



There's no shortage of thrawn in Manitoba — certainly not among the St. Andrew's Society of Winnipeg, which organized the local community event of the Great Canadian Kilt Skate.



Back in 2015 "The Peg" was among the four cities to host a Great Canadian Kilt Skate in its inaugural year. Anyone who participated that January day — whether in Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary or Ottawa —

will recall the weather across Canada was exceptionally cold.

There are so many thrawn individuals in Winnipeg that, last year, it won the title of **Kilt Skate Capital** of **Canada**. This year, on Louis Riel Day in Manito-



ba, (Family Day in many other parts of Canada, President's Day in the U.S.) Winnipeggers came out once again to defy the elements and show their true Scottish spirit.


Among the proud Scots and Scots-at-heart were

IRENE BOYD 1947 – 2022

rene Elizabeth Boyd (nee Mills), dearly beloved wife of RBANA Past President Robert Boyd, passed away peacefully at home in Houston, Texas on 8th January, 2022 after a long illness. Irene was born and raised in Largs. She met Robert at a wedding of mutual friends in Robert's hometown Prestwick and they were married in Largs in 1969. Having moved around the UK quite a bit, ending up in the London area, Robert got an opportunity to move to the United States. The Boyds, now with three young daughters, moved to Houston in 1987. They joined the Heather & Thistle Society there in time to attend the Burns Supper in 1988 and were enthusiastic members from then on. Robert and Irene first joined the broader Burns community in 2007 when they went to the joint RBWF/RBANA meeting in Winnipeg to help promote the concept of Houston hosting the 2008 RBANA Annual Conference on a cruise ship out of Galveston. Irene immediately became a popular addition with her winning smile and infectious laugh. She was the main behind-the-scenes organizer of the RBANA cruise in March 2008 both beforehand and on the ship itself. She had always been very supportive of Robert's move to the US, and also when he became H&T Chieftain in 2008 and RBANA President in 2014. Irene's last hurral came when she was the gracious hostess of the 2016 RBANA Annual Conference in Dallas. Her health declined steadily from then on, but she retained her positive attitude right to the end.



THEODORE S "TED" HIRTZ 1936 – 2022

heodore S. Hirtz, Jr. US Director of RBANA from 2006 until 2018, was born in St. Louis, MO, on March 6, 1936, and passed away peacefully at his home in Houston, Texas on February 21, 2022. Ted's family moved east to New York when he was a youngster of 9. Ted studied Roman and Greek history at Harvard University, graduating in 1958, followed by a stint in the US Marine Corps. With his first wife Nancy he moved to Stanford University, where Ted studied law, graduating in 1963. He spent his entire career in the law in Houston, first as an Assistant District Attorney with Harris County before entering private practice, eventually on his own. Ted never feared representing the underdog against great odds. He loved Texas and wanted to establish law regarding her eroding coastline. He retired at age 85 and worked full days until he was hospitalized with metastatic kidney cancer in August 2021. Ted married Susan Elaine Akers in 1986. Susan and Ted enjoyed ballroom dancing and they would take off to explore the corners of the world. In 53 years, Ted rarely missed a Tuesday singing with the Houston Saengerbund. Ted was a member of the Tax Forum, Rotary Club of Houston, and the Old Lions. He was a 50+ year member with Holland Lodge No. 1 and served on the Board of the Battleship Texas Foundation. He served as president of the English-Speaking Union. Ted is survived by Susan, his loving wife of 35 years; his three sons and their wives; and six grandchildren.

Ted's lifelong love of Burns led him to join the Heather & Thistle Society soon after he moved to Houston, and he remained an active member for the rest of his life. He was Chieftain in 1992. In the mid 1980s Jack Hume started a Burns Study Group within H&T. Ted was an enthusiastic member from the start and attended the monthly meetings until the last year of his life. He was noted for his thoughtful and always incisive input. Ted's legal background was extremely useful during his time as a director of RBANA especially when revisions of the association's constitution were required in the 1980s and again in the 2000s. Ted always played a key role in H&T ceilidhs and the annual Burns Club performances. As Jack Hume's widow Guida noted on the news of his untimely death, "Ted loved to dress in western gear or Scottish garb or sea shanty regalia: anyplace where he could sing. As if he weren't already the tallest one there, he could add a Stetson or a tam with a cockle to emphasize it. We will miss dear Ted. He will remain the exclamation point in our lives".





Burns Season Busy in Georgia: The McClellan Report

With the declining fear of the Covid business, mandated masks, vaccines and all that nonsense, the January 2022 Robert Burns celebrations in North Georgia, USA, have restarted apace. For me, Franklin North Carolina's Taste of Scotland group held the first Burns Dinner of the season at the 1st Presbyterian Church in Franklin, NC. As an RBANA Director and Burns Club of Atlanta member, I was invited to present the Toast to the Immortal Memory, the subject of which was Burns, the Legend. It was very well received.



The dinner was a grand occasion. The Church's fest hall, already festooned with tartan panels of as many as twenty clans, enriched the atmosphere. A local Celtic band, all members of the Taste of Scotland, entertained guests with a really inspired musical selection of Celtic favorites. They were very good too but, unfortunately missing their chan-

teuse. Didn't matter. The show went on as expected and guests, a few actually from the old country, broke out into sone along with the band.

A first rate buffet style dinner of standard American style Scottish fare, of roast beef, taters, greens and cock-a-leek soup, highlighted the evenings offering. The Haggis was appropriately piped in by a club member accompanied and the Address to the Haggis was rendered by an old hand who has done this sort of thing for years.

The Masonic Lodge of Sand Springs, Bro. Mark Ferguson the new Lodge Master, also held a Burns dinner on its January lodge meeting night where I had the pleasure of both piping in the haggis and giving

the address to the Immortal Memory on Burns and Masonry.

Finally, the annual Burns Dinner event at the Olde Blind Dog Pub in, Milton, Ga. Rounded out my participation in the 2022, Burns Dinner events. I was honored to give the address to the haggis and the toast to the immortal memory. The Olde Blind Dog Pub fashions itself as an Irish Pub with imported original booths, wall appointments, paneling and bric a brac of the Victorian era festooned on walls every-

where. This is a happening happy place, always filled. The organizer is a policeman from Roswell PD with a Scottish history of sorts. I believe he said this was the twelfth such



dinner at the Pub, last year being passed due to the Covid mandates.

A great Celtic band, the Border Collies, performed music to a full house, for the evening entertainment followed by a Ceilidh of poem reading and song singing before the evening concluded.
