Fredericton Burns Statue Returns to Public View

A remodelled statue of the Scottish poet Robert

Burns was unveiled in early September in Fredericton NB. Plans are in place for it to be joined outside the Beaverbrook Gallery by a statue of gallery benefactor Lord Beaverbrook, currently located down the road.

Made of bronze and more than three metres tall on a granite pedestal, the Burns statue, first installed in 1906 was taken down in 2008 for repairs, and renovations to the Beaverbrook Gallery.

The statue's future was uncertain when the city announced, in 2010, to the dismay of Fredericton's Scottish Community, that it could not afford the \$80,000 in flood-proofing and other repairs, the statue needed.

Prominent New Brunswick Tycoon J.K. Irving and

his wife Jean donated the money to replace the stat-

ue, and Jean Irving was given the honour of pulling the tartan off Burns.

"It's our heritage, and J.K.'s heritage, and the children's heritage, some of them over here," said Jean Irving. "We thank you for this honour, that we can come and participate with you and enjoy this day." The City of Fredericton closed a section of Queen Street for a parade in Burns's honour.

Tom Smart, CEO and director of the Beaverbrook Art Gallery, is hoping the two statues will reinvent the Green outside the gallery and give it more of a "park-like feel" for the public.

"We see this as extending our reach into the park and engaging the community on a whole different level," he said. .



As mentioned in his Page 1 remarks, on Thursday, 8 November, RBANA president Ken Montgomery was privileged to attend the November meeting of the Edmonton Burns Club (EBC) in Edmonton. An important aspect of the conference was the presence of delegates from the USA, Canada, Australia and Norway reinforcing the international appeal of our National Bard which deserves to be actively nurtured to ensure his legacy continues to flour- Outgoing President Ian ish abroad.

In addition to the AGM, two splendid dinners, a seminar,

a ceilidh and an uplifting church service, the main event was the inauguration of the new President of the Federation, Bill Nolan, from Irvine.

The weekend witnessed a wonderful collaboration between the Federation's conference committee, Irvine Burns Club, Irvine Lasses Burns Club and North Ayrshire Council all working extremely hard to provide an exciting and most enjoyable event. The Irvine Town Hall and Leisure Centre, 'The Portal,' proved an excellent venue for the Inaugural Dinner with superb catering being provided by the North Ayrshire Catering Services. The Town Hall was also the Thursday night venue for a reception

Margaretann understandably would like to be nearer her home and family and had reluctantly offered her resignation. McIntyre spoke for the whole conference when he praised Margaretann for her dedication, integrity. professionalism and. above all, her unfailing



and uplifting sense of humour even through the most challenging times. She will be very much missed.

The good news, however, is that Beverley Thomson, the current administration assistant, has agreed to step up to the vacant post thus providing a welcome degree of continuity, expertise and another cheery voice at the end of the phone.

At the seminar on Saturday afternoon Professor Murray Pittock, Vice Principal and Bradley Chair of English Literature at the University of Glasgow, outlined a Scottish Government backed research study, led by the University, to assess the economic value of Robert Burns to Scotland.

The data-gathering phase will be essential, and Prof. Pittock enlisted the help of Burns Clubs and individual members in completing a questionnaire on the financial impact of Burns Suppers and other events associated with the Poet.

In a second presentation Senior Researcher Moira Hansen, a PhD student at the University of Glasgow, posed the question "Was Robert Burns bipolar?" (See Tattler Winter 2017) Using a variety of

techniques from today's medical world she has been conducting an in-depth study of Burns's changing state of mind as revealed in his writings and by some of his very open and honest self-assessments in letters.

The provisional results from her fascinating study suggest Burns demonstrated distinct phases of hypomania and opposite periods of low, depressive, mental state which would almost certainly categorise him today as being Type 2 on the bi-polar spectrum.

The conference was rounded off on Sunday morning with a wonderful service of worship in the Irvine Old Parish Church led by Rev Neil Urquhart, attended by several of the civic organisations of the town.

Following the service there was an opportunity to attend a wreath laying ceremony at the Burns statue before the skies opened up.
